



Dear Parents, Families, Students and Staff,

This is the second in a series of Newsletters with a focus on the nexus between wellbeing and learning.

At Holy Family we ask our staff to build our students up. The first step in this process is getting to know each child. We ask staff to never speak disparagingly about students either individually or collectively. We believe that every child at Holy Family can learn: they are readers, authors and mathematicians. If we build them up, they will rise to the occasion:

- Their likes, their interests, what they're good at, and what they need help with;
- Their dislikes, what can upset them and how they express this, and their calming skills;
- Their favourite hobbies, books, songs, sports and TV programmes.

We like to know about their hopes and aspirations:

- Short and long term goals for their learning, building on what they can do well;
- Ideas for their future following their interests;
- Broad future dreams.

At Holy Family we encourage teachers to balance providing students with challenge whilst providing them with more than adequate support. Our school values are: **Positive Emotion, Trust and Support.**

We ask staff to consider how well they know and understand their students: their cultural history, interests, passions, strengths, sensitivities and differences.



We ask staff to reflect on how they use that information to:

- congratulate a student on an achievement outside school;
- make personal connections to a student's cultural heritage such as their mob;
- create opportunities for students to share and develop gifts and talents that could remain hidden in school;
- share a kind word when a student is feeling low;
- eliminate or minimise situations that may cause unnecessary stress;
- identify the student's personal signs of stress or unhappiness and intervene early;
- have a timely conversation with a student about what staff have noticed and how to develop coping strategies;
- more accurately interpret wider classroom/playground behaviour and pre-empt potential areas of conflict.



At Holy Family we treasure our relationships with families and the child's safety, ongoing learning and wellbeing are all of paramount importance to us when we communicate with families.

- We take a no-surprises approach in our relationship with families. We don't "save up" conversations for parents and caregivers. We encourage teachers to keep in regular contact with you and work collaboratively to provide timely support for your children;
- We ensure that in written reports the focus is on what your child can do. In the classroom we ensure every child can access the curriculum at their level but that each child can take their learning to the ceiling;
- If we think that there are ways you can help at home, we will let you know.

I encourage you to continue to read our Newsletters, e-mails, text messages as we strive to keep you totally informed about what is going on at school. Also, we have the Class Blogs and *Holy Family Writes* to keep track of learning progress in our wonderful school.



FOR YOUR INFORMATION

School routines:

- SCHOOL START School starts at 8.50am, children must be under supervision of adults at all times. Yard Duty begins at 8.30am, if they arrive earlier they need to attend OSHC;
- LATE ARRIVALS If your child is later than 8.50am they <u>must</u> sign in at Student Reception;
- SCHOOL FINISH School finishes at 3pm if you <u>cannot</u> collect your child by 3.10pm, they need
 to go to OSHC;
- **PICK UP/DROP OFF SAFETY** Please use the Kiss and Drop Zone and **DO NOT** drop off your children in the car parks or park in Disabled Zones ... it is illegal;
- **SAFETY** Please don't walk on the driveways, use the footpaths, don't walk in or out of the vehicle entry/exit gates;
- LABELLING please label all removable clothing (ie. jumpers, jackets, hats), label school bags, drink bottles, lunch boxes and anything else your child may bring;
- PERSONAL ITEMS No toys, electronics or sports equipment to be brought to school (laptops available for lease Years R-1 and provided for Years 2-6, sports equipment available from class teacher);
- NUT FREE A reminder we are a <u>nut free</u> school. This includes but is not limited to Nutella,
 Peanut Butter and some muesli bars.
- STAFF CAR PARK The inside carpark is for STAFF only.
- **GATES** All gates are locked everyday at 9.15am and re-opened at 2.15pm. During these times you must come through the front office and sign in.

Laptops

The laptops are a great tool for the students. Here are a few tips for looking after them:

- No food or drink near the laptop;
- Store in a safe and dry area;
- Use in a dry area (ie not near sinks or wash areas);
- Do not run or walk with the laptop in the open position;
- Do not run with the laptop;
- Always ensure the protective cover is on and not tampered with.

The development of the Philosophy includes the voice and perspectives of all members of each of the Centres community including children, parents/families, staff and Holy Family Catholic School

The Bible and I **Prayers in the Bible 6** (continued)

Prayer is talking to God.

People in the bible is a people of prayer. One can find prayers everywhere in the Bible. Abraham the father of the faithful was a man of prayer. He lived always in the presence of God. Moses, chosen to be the liberator of the people of Israel from slavery in Egypt, was in continuous dialogue with God.

"As we read the Old Testament we note one figure who stands out from among the others: Moses, precisely, as a man of prayer. Moses, the great prophet and leader at the time of the Exodus, carried out his role as mediator between God and Israel by making himself a messenger to the people of God's words and divine commands, by leading it towards the freedom of the Promised Land and by teaching the Israelites to live obeying God and trusting in him during their long sojourn in the desert. However, I would say also, and above all, by praying.

Moses prayed for the Pharaoh when God, with the plagues, was endeavouring to convert the Egyptians' hearts (cf. Ex 8-10); Moses asked the Lord to heal his sister Miriam, afflicted with leprosy (cf. Num 12:9-13); he interceded for the people which had rebelled fearful of what those who had spied out the land would report (cf. Num 14:1-19); he prayed when fire was about to burn down the camp (cf. Num 11:1-2), and when poisonous serpents decimated the people (cf. Num 21:4-9); he addressed the Lord and reacted by protesting when the burden of his mission became too heavy (cf. Num 11:10-15); he saw God and spoke "to him face to face, as a man speaks to his friend" (cf. Ex 24:9-17; 7-23; 34:1-10, 28-35).

And on Sinai, even while the people were asking Aaron to make a golden calf, Moses prayed, explaining with symbols his own role as intercessor. The episode is recounted in chapter 32 of the Book of Exodus and there is a parallel account in chapter 9 of Deuteronomy." (Pope Benedict XVI)

"And the Lord instructed Moses to tell Aaron the priest and his sons how to bless the children of Israel with this prayer:

May the Lord bless you and keep you.

May the Lord make His face to shine upon you

and be gracious unto you.

May the Lord lift His countenance upon you and give you peace."

"And this prayer shall put My name on the children of Israel, and I will bless them," (Numbers 6:22-27)
